

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

The spring newsletter had a very informative article concerning what type of 'green space' could be created on the land when the intermediate school is no longer in use. It will be turned over to the village for a use to benefit all residents. Besides using it as a green space there are other alternatives to this plan.

We have received a lot of input from residents of the village and what they would like to see happen. One big consideration to remember is that the village will lose \$15,000 to \$20,000 in income tax money when there are no longer school employees working in the village. Although not a large amount it will curtail smaller projects that could be financed with that money.

Our current administration building, and council chambers are very small and inadequate. There are very few seats for visitors and concerned individuals to sit in when attending meetings. We need more secure storage for equipment and village records. There is no large conference room for meetings in either of our town buildings. Saving and utilizing the back part of the school could give us additional space.

If the back part of the school was saved there would be a gymnasium for the community to have access to plus restrooms and 6 classrooms. The rooms could be used for a senior citizen center, card clubs, Council Chambers, office area, record, and equipment storage to name a few.

There is also the option of selling part of the property for new homes that would bring in property taxes, income taxes, and more customers for our businesses.

We have many 'green space' areas in our township. There is the Waterwork Park with 2 ball fields and plenty of space. There is the Ohio-Erie Canal Trail winding through the village, and many sidewalks to walk on in town. Lawrence township has the 'River Park', the Wilkshire Blvd. trail, the Zoar Arboretum, the Bolivar Dam playground and soccer area, and the Commons Pool.

Of course, all these ideas and more are being discussed among many residents and council members. It's something that will take many hours of thought and consideration to decide the best course of action. The school has until the spring or summer of 2024 to make their final determination on a 'demolition' timetable. The school will be used for storage for the following school year.
